## **BEST PRACTICE: 1**

## 1. Title: INTER-DISCIPLINARY COURSES

#### 2. Context:

Human knowledge has become unmanageably vast, every branch of science has been perpetually expanding... like Physiology discovering inexhaustible mystery in every organ, Psychology in every dream and Technology in all spheres of life.

Today perspectives are lost, facts replace understanding and knowledge splits into a thousand isolated fragments, no longer generating wisdom. Hence, Inter Disciplinary courses are the need of the hour to foster areas for integrating and synthesizing knowledge towards developing a well-rounded education. Such courses aim at developing concepts, strategies and skills that can be applied in any discipline.

## 3. Objectives:

- > To expose students about the basic principles of various streams of knowledge
- > To enable them to prepare for successful and challenging careers
- ➤ To bridge communication gaps in the modern era and mobilize the enormous intellectual resources in the cause of greater societal transformation
- ➤ To develop creative thinking and critical analysis

H. Basic Mathematics and Bio-Statistics

#### 4. Practices:

Keeping the aforesaid objectives in mind, the college has conducted Inter-disciplinary courses for all the second and third year students during the month of November, 2013. The duration of the course was 15 hours. The following courses were offered:

A. Health & Nutrition
B. Basics of Banking, Insurance and Management
C. Medicinal Botany and Genetic Counseling
D. Web Designing
E. Indian Polity, Economy and Basics in Administration
F. Nano-Technology
G. Organizational Behavior

#### A. Health and Nutrition:

The Departments of Biochemistry, Microbiology and Zoology organized a course on Health and Nutrition for the final year B.A. and B.Com. students. The course covered general anatomy of the human body, the role of hormones and nutrients, emotional responses generated, and the causes and prevention of common infectious diseases.

## B. <u>Basics of Banking, Insurance & Management:</u>

The Department of Commerce organized this course for M.P.Cs. & M.S.Cs. final year students. The course covered basic Banking services, Management concepts and elements of Insurance.

## C. Medicinal Botany and Genetic Counselling:

The Department of Botany and Bio-Technology conducted this course for students of second year Physical Sciences. Systems of medicines, types of drugs, role of tissue culture in medicinal plants, Transgenic medicinal plants, secondary metabolites, Pedigree-Family tree, Mode of inheritance and genetic diseases and counselling concepts were covered.

#### D. Web Designing:

The Department of Computer Science organized this course for B.Com (Regular) second year students. The course included basics of HTML, DHTML and Static Web Page designing.

#### E. Indian Polity, Economy and Basics of Administration:

The Departments of Political Science, Economics and Public Administration organized this course for B.Com. (Computer Science) second year students. The topics discussed were:

#### **Indian Polity:**

Organization of Parliament and its functioning, Election of the President and his powers, Organization of Supreme Court and its functions and various socioeconomic issues like influences of caste, religion and regionalism on Indian Polity.

## **Indian Economy:**

Liberalization, Globalization, Privatization and Issue of currency

#### **Basics of Indian Administration:**

The concept of Good Governance and the role of Civil Servants in administration

#### F. Nano technology:

The Department of Chemistry and Physics took up this course for second year Social Sciences students highlighting the "Fundamentals of Nano-technology and its applications in daily life".

## G. Organizational Behaviour:

The Department of Business Administration organized a course on Organizational Behaviour for Life Sciences students. Topics like Leadership, Motivation, Communication, Conflicts, Group Dynamism and Teamwork were discussed.

## H. Basic Mathematics and Bio-Statistics:

The Department of Mathematics and Statistics conducted classes for second year Life Sciences students on basic Arithmetic, Differentiation, Integration and basic Statistics.

#### 5. Obstacles faced if any and strategies adopted to overcome them

#### **Obstacles Faced:**

Teaching an Inter-disciplinary course is a challenge. Hence initial obstacles faced in imparting such courses included apprehensions of faculty and also students; designing time-bound course content and making necessary adjustments in the regular timetable. It was also observed that there was a lack of willingness on part of the students to learn new disciplines and it became a challenge in making them comprehend the basic concepts.

## **Strategies adopted to overcome the problems:**

The faculty strived to orient and motivate the students, emphasizing the need for broadening their knowledge base through Interdisciplinary courses. Efforts were made by the faculty to design the course content and adjust their timetables according to the requirements. Various methods like power point presentations, seminars, skits, charts, models, etc, were adopted to arouse interest and understand the concepts easily.

#### 6. <u>Impact of the practice:</u>

The students expressed that these courses provided them with extra information beyond their curriculum. They felt that an interdisciplinary approach to learning would definitely equip them to face competitive examinations and also real life challenges.

The course on "Basics of Banking, Insurance & Management" helped the students in dealing with various financial services and inculcated a sense of financial discipline among them.

The course conducted by the Department of Social Sciences facilitated the students in understanding the procedures of Parliament, the significance of fundamental rights, and the impact of economic policies and necessity for transparency in administration.

The courses conducted by the Departments of Life Sciences aided the students in understanding the effect of hormones in the body and their regulation, through balanced diet. The Genetic Counselling course which furnished information about the Genetic diseases was found to be very useful by the students.

## 7. Resources Required:

As the interdisciplinary courses were conducted in the classrooms not many resources were needed except for provision of LCD projectors, and for the preparation of a few charts and models. The teachers from different departments acted as the resource persons for these courses.

#### 2. The Context:
