3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

- The Institution adopted a pair of peacocks and Indian Gharial of Nehru Zoological Park, Hyderabad as part of social responsibility to save animals and birds. Through this conservation movement, students were instilled with a sense of preserving endangered animals/species
- Awareness program was organised on e-waste management for students and neighbouring community. 200 kgs of e-waste was collected and disposed in an eco-friendly way.
- A research project was undertaken to study the effects of Surface and Ground water pollution due to heavy metals in different parts of Hyderabad. The research findings were communicated to the local community, media, and NGO SOUL (Save Our Urban Lakes). The Student Research Group "SPUGER" gave a representation with a placard about heavy metal pollution in ground water in Nacharam area to Sri. T. Harish Rao (Hon'ble Minister for Irrigation, Marketing and Legislative Affairs, Telangana) during "Restoration of lakes in Telangana" organised by Council for Green Revolution on the occasion of World Water Day.
- As a part of "**Save the Sparrow Programme**" the college has taken the initiative to provide wooden nests for sparrows.
- A National Seminar on Conservation of Water Bodies was organised on 23-24 January, 2015 in which new approaches to conserve water bodies and ways to safeguard the water bodies from urbanisation were deliberated upon.
- A Science Academies' Lecture Workshop titled " Recent Advancement in Environmental Sciences in sustaining Natural Resources and Maintaining Healthy Livelihood" was organised which provided a common platform for scientific experts and students to discuss about the Emerging trends in Environmental Sciences.

- An awareness campaign on “Need for Pollution Check” for the vehicles of students and faculty in the campus was conducted.
- “Prudent use of Electricity” a poster campaign programme was organised in the campus to reinforce the importance of the need to save electricity.
- A project titled “Solid waste management in St.Pious X Degree & PG College for Women” was carried out by B.Sc II nd Year (MGC) students and Segregation of waste (dry and wet) in the college campus using colour coded dustbins was initiated
- ORANGE YOUR NEIGHBOURHOOD – a campaign for violence against women was organised during 5-9 December 2014 by informative talks on Women Laws and Walk Campaign in neighbourhood

- Constant review of Testing and Evaluation patterns encourages creativity, originality and analytical thinking of the students.
- Faculty members are motivated to design contemporary, skill based and Value-added courses.
- Training sessions for the Faculty are organized to enhance their teaching skills.
- Faculty attend seminars, refresher courses, workshops and other faculty development programs to keep abreast of the latest developments in their respective fields.
- Field trips, Industrial visits, Case studies, projects, and Group discussions are encouraged to facilitate Experiential learning.
- Photo Exhibition by B.A. (Mass Comm) students showcasing their talent in photography as part of their learning curriculum.
- B.A. (Mass Comm) students were given training in shooting of short films. They have utilized this training in shooting a short film on college campus and activities.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- The College Evaluates students through various Assessment tests, Unit tests, Term examinations and Pre-Final examinations.
- Continuous Comprehensive Examination (CCE) is practiced all through the year. CCE methods include Objective tests, Assignments, Case study reports, Group discussions apart from regular subjective tests. Students and Faculty are well informed about the pattern of CCE.
- Evaluated answer sheets are given to the students with instructions to improve their learning skills and subject knowledge.
- The College monitors the academic performance of the students through mentor system with necessary guidance.

- Open book system, online assignments and examinations are also practiced.

- The Management encourages the Faculty to pursue M.Phil and Ph.D programs. Currently, 6 are pursuing Ph.D and one has been awarded Ph.D.
- Along with the Faculty, students are motivated and guided to take up Research projects funded by the Management.
- The project work carried out by the Faculty is published in various National & International Journals.

- Faculty are provided financial aid for attending Seminars and Paper Presentations.
- Necessary equipment is added to facilitate Research work.
- Faculty were trained in usage of SPSS package for Research work.
- Students were trained in Scientific Writing.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- Every year the Management allocates budget for library upgradation towards purchasing latest Editions of books.
- Library Software like NLIST from INFLIBNET, EBSCO-Buisness elite, J-Gate and NewGenLib 3.04 are used. INFLIBNET has been upgraded from 3.0 to 3.1
- The College library subscribes to the UGC N-List programme.
- 13 Sage Journals are subscribed in both print and online formats.
- To cater to the needs of the underprivileged students, a Book Bank is also available.
- Audiovisual teaching aids like LCDs, CDs, Smart Board with Internet connectivity are also provided.
- Camtasia Software is installed to enable the lecturers to prepare video lectures.
- SAP Software is installed to enhance students' cutting-edge speciality and Employability skills.
- A Laboratory for the Psychology Dept. was established.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- Various committees are constituted and the responsibilities are assigned to the Faculty.
- The responsibility of major events/programmes in the college is distributed amongst all the departments. Fresher's day, Investiture ceremony, College Day, Resonance and Valedictory Programme. Important days such as St. Pious Feast, Independence Day, Republic Day, Women's Day are some of the major programs observed and celebrated.
- Members of the Student Council and class representatives who are in charge of various activities are given guidance by the concerned faculty.
- Planning and Evaluation Committee with Heads of departments and members of the IQAC are involved in scheduling Academic and Co-Curricular activities.
- Guidance and Counselling for the non-teaching staff strengthen the sense of belongingness.

- Advertisement of vacancies for Faculty positions is given in leading regional and English newspapers. The notification is also put on the college website. Applications are invited from Eligible candidates (eligibility as per university norms).
- The eligible candidates are short listed after screening the applications and called for an interview. The Selection Committee constituting Subject Experts nominated by Osmania University, Principal and Heads of department, interviews the shortlisted candidates for recruitment.
- In the Academic year 2014-15, Five faculty members were selected by the selection committee and appointed by the Management.

- Physics Dept collaborated with Physitech Industries for organizing projects in Embedded Systems.
- Physics dept. has also collaborated with Earth Sense Recycle Ltd. for collecting and disposing e-waste in an Eco-friendly manner.
- Field trips and Industrial visits expose students to work-place Environments. This year students were taken to industries like Coca –Cola, Veeramani Biscuits industries Ltd, Sai LARA Biologicals- Plant tissue culture unit, Economic Times, NFC.

- Placement Cell has collaborated with various MNCs like IBM,WIPRO, Cognizant, TCS etc; and Pre Placement Training was given to the final year students and placement sessions were held.

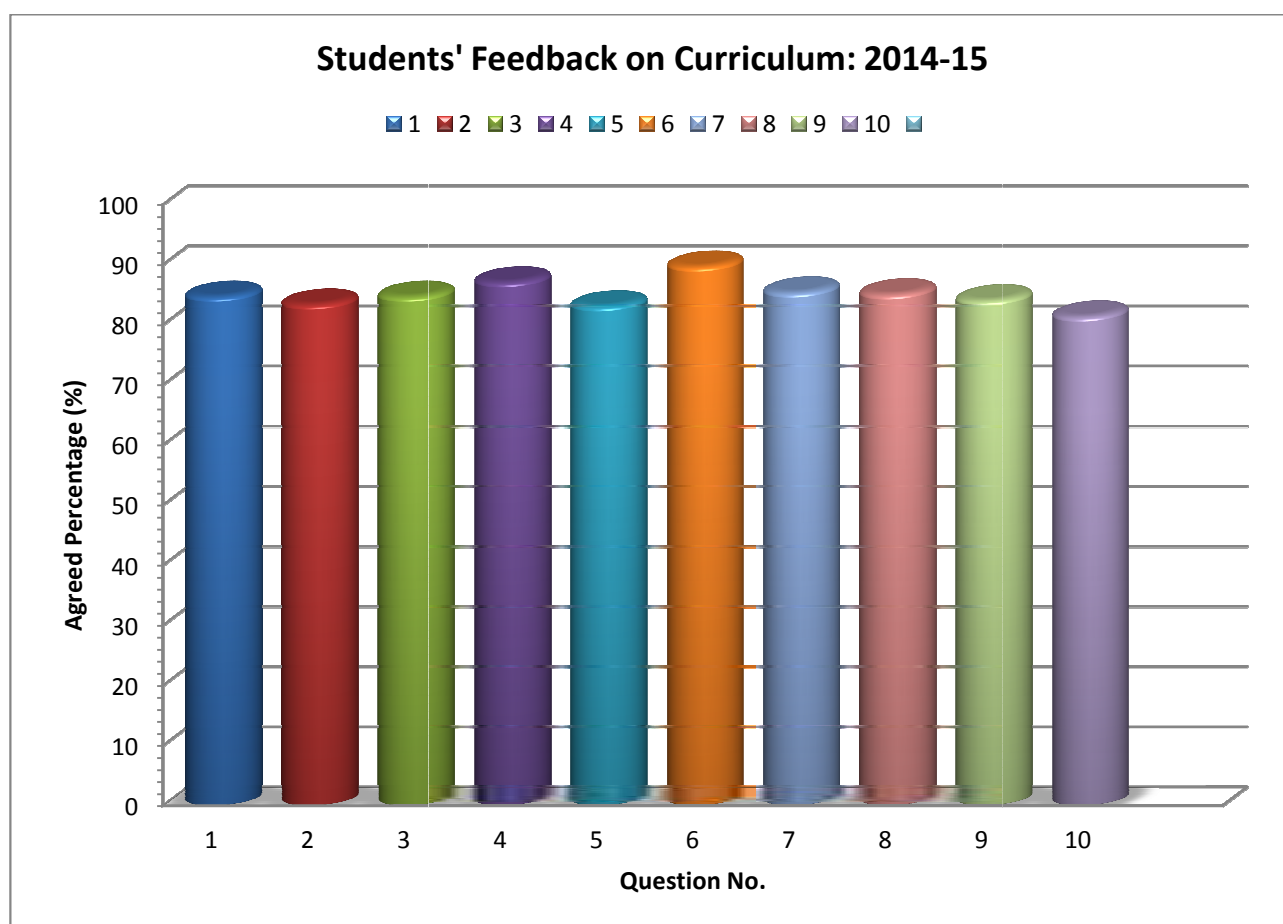

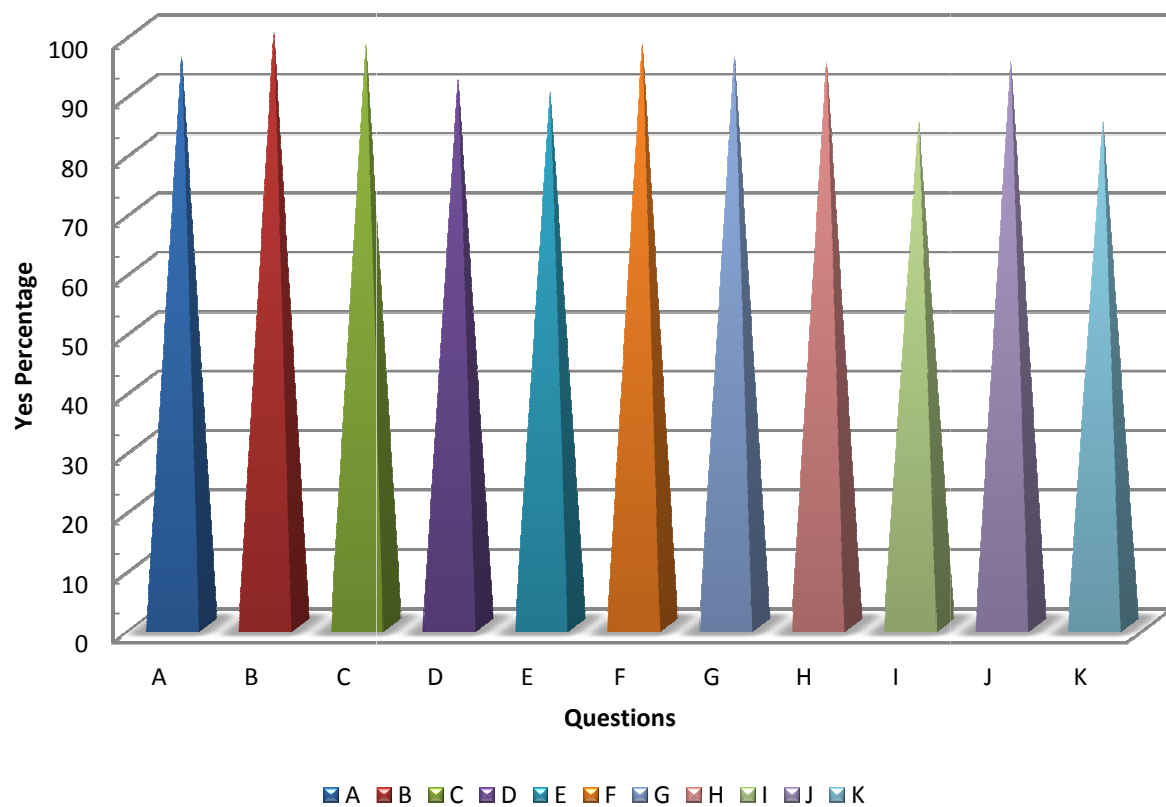

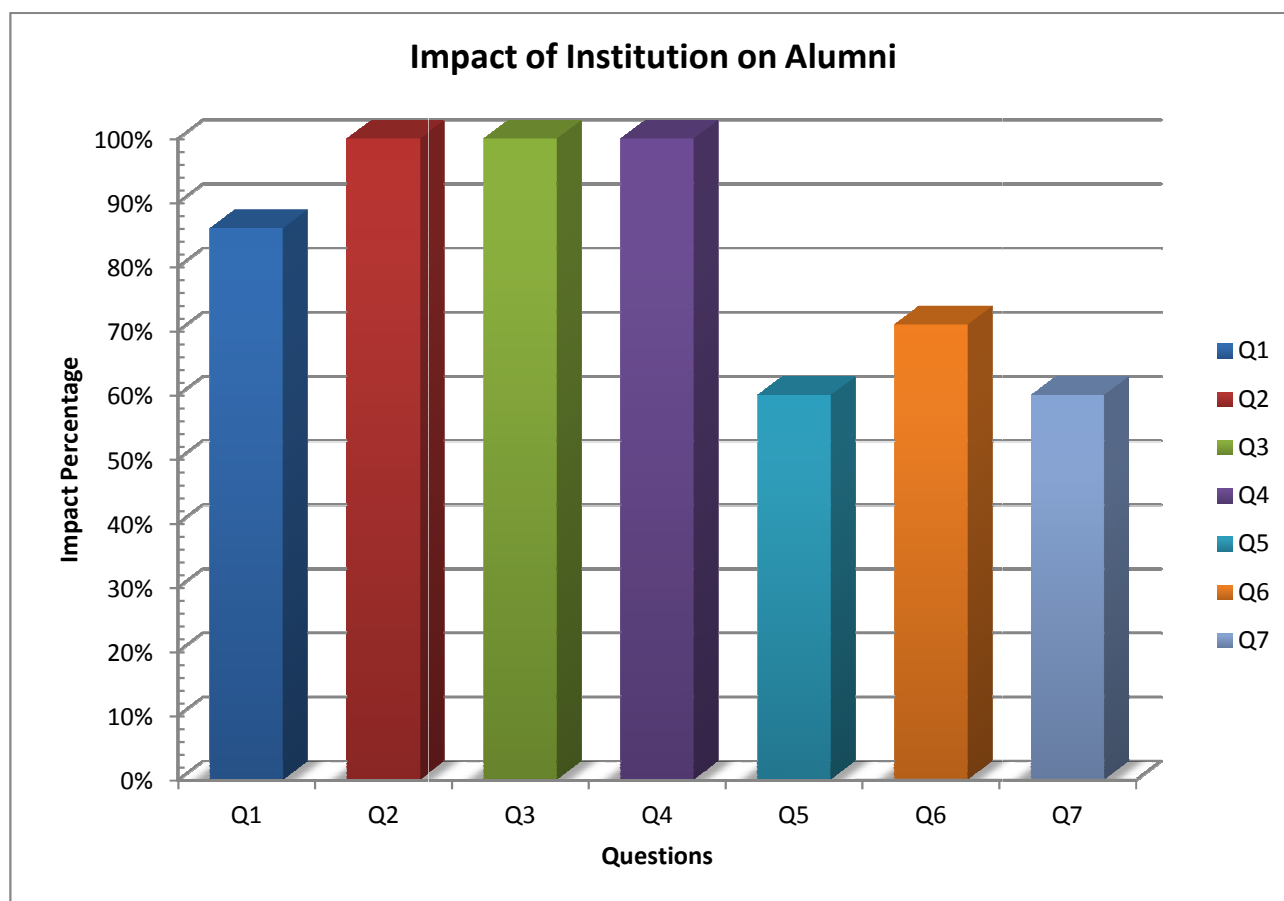
Parents' Feedback Analysis 2014-15



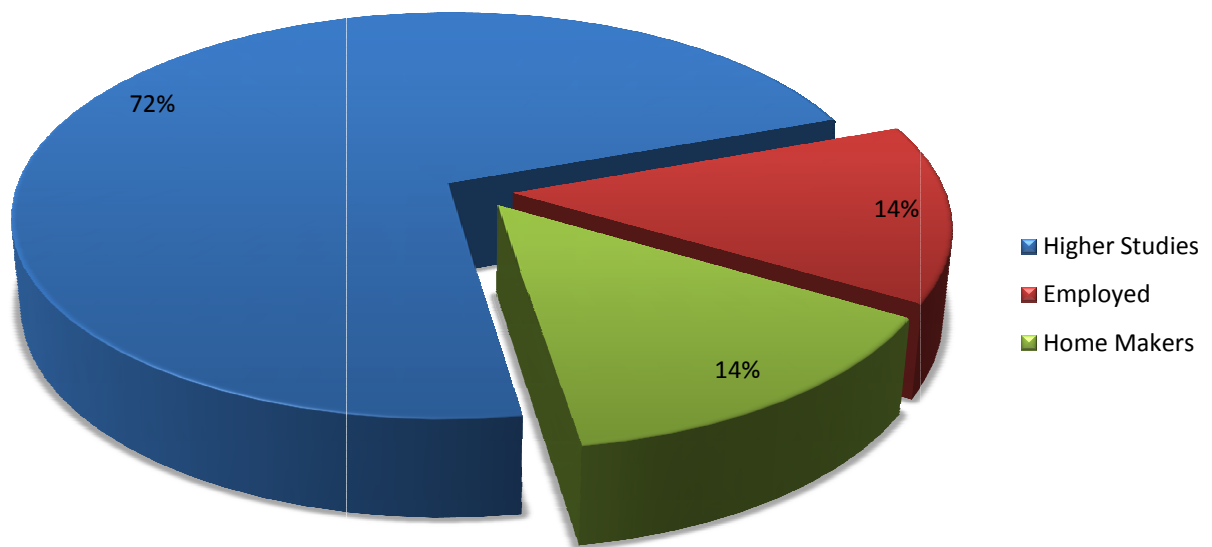

Best Practice: (i)

1. Title: Eco friendly practices

2. Context:

Human society is facing an unprecedented situation due to the impact of anthropogenic activities on Environment that has grown rapidly and steadily to a state, where it has far exceeded the regenerative capacities of earth's ecosystems resulting in degradation of the environment. Hence there is an urgent need to sensitize the general population regarding this.

What we do today will at large determine what sort of world we leave for the upcoming generations. Today's students would lead our world in such a most critical era for assuring our planet's sustainability. Therefore Educational Institutions should work to equip them for this responsibility. In addition to their educational objectives, Universities must continue to do even more in the research arena to provide feasible and result oriented solutions for reducing pollution.

1. Objectives:

- To create awareness of the significance of environmental protection
- To inculcate a sense of social responsibility towards prevention of pollution
- To educate the young students about the role of science and technology in the protection of Environment
- To understand the various aspects of environmental problems and solutions
- To encourage Environment sustaining practices

2. Practice:

- A. A student Research Program to understand the degradation of ecosystem due to heavy metal pollution of surface and ground water of different parts of Hyderabad was undertaken.
- B. A community awareness programme was organised on 19th March, 2015 to promote awareness about the heavy metal contamination of ground water in Nacharam area. Residents of the locality, media, and NGO SOUL (Save Our Urban Lakes) attended this programme.
- C. On 22nd March, 2015, the student SPUGER group gave their representation with a placard about heavy metal pollution of Nacharam to Sri. T. Harish Rao (Hon'ble Minister for Irrigation, Marketing and Legislative Affairs, Telangana)
- D. A Science Academies' Lecture Workshop titled "Recent Advancement in Environmental Sciences in sustaining Natural Resources and Maintaining Healthy Livelihood" was organised on 22-23 August, 2014.

- E. A National Seminar on Conservation of Water Bodies was organised on 23-24 January, 2015 in which new approaches to conserve water bodies and ways to safeguard the water bodies from urbanisation were deliberated upon.
- F. An awareness programme on “e- Waste” was organised for the students and the surrounding areas of the college. On 18th July, 2014, 200 kgs of e- waste was collected and disposed in an eco-friendly way.
- G. On 25th September, 2014 an awareness campaign on “Need for Pollution Check” for the vehicles of students and faculty in the campus was conducted.
- H. “Prudent use of Electricity” was organised to reinforce the importance of the need to save electricity. It was conducted from 25th Oct – 1st Nov, 2014.
- I. A project titled “Solid Waste Management in St. Pious X Degree & PG College for Women” was carried out by B.Sc. 2nd Year (MGC) students.

3. Obstacles faced if any and strategies adopted to overcome them:

Obstacles faced: Inculcating an awareness of the Earth’s limited resources and the need to utilize them properly is a challenge, as we live in an acquisitive world where more wealth means more power and authority.

Strategies adopted to overcome them: A student research body SPUGER was created to foster a sense of team spirit and the need to work together towards a better and sustainable world.

As mentioned above, various departments motivated and inspired students to organize and create awareness programs related to climate change, loss of bio-diversity, effects of deforestation, etc.

4. Impact of the Practice:

- Students involved with enormous awareness in protecting the Environment and also the need for Sustainable Growth.
- Students showed greater commitment to proper utilisation of expensive resources like Electricity and scarce resources like Water.
- The neighbourhood community realised and were extremely aware of the pollution levels of ground water.
- Segregation of waste into dry and wet categories into colour-coded dustbins is practised in college campus.
- A healthy competitive spirit emerged among the teaching community to present and publish papers

5. Resources Required:

A team of well motivated faculty and students and finances.

Best Practice: 2(ii)

1. Title: Capacity Building Programs

2. Context:

Building abilities, relationships and values enables organizations, faculty and students to improve their performance and achieve their objectives. It is a key asset to an Institution. Capacity and Capability building relates both to the Organizational and Functional levels.

At the very least, capacity building has three dimensions: building awareness, building analytical capacity and building decision-making capacity. It can be targeted at different individuals and communities. The Institution believes in using its resources at its disposal to build not only infrastructural facilities but also mould students into independent thinkers.

3. Objectives:

- To encourage the faculty and the students towards primary research
- To foster in students , a scientific temper
- To encourage them to think for themselves and develop life skills
- To enhance the association between Education and Society
- To educate non-teaching staff in using Computer technology

4. Practice:

- A. Faculty Development Programs were conducted to strengthen the prevailing capacities of the Faculty in Research and Teaching. All the 5 FDPs, sponsored by various Institutions, were organized in the college.
- B. Student Enrichment Programs were conducted for meritorious and committed students to excel in their Academics and Sports.
- C. Seminars/Workshops/Certificate courses for students on Communication skills, Life skills, Environmental protection, SAP ERP, E-waste management, and pre-placement activities were conducted to orient the students towards gaining Employability skills.
- D. Research Projects, that are of immediate value to society, involving both the faculty and the students are organized. The research findings are communicated to the society at large through talks, poster presentations and paper publications
- E. A Laboratory for the Psychology Dept. was established by the Management to train and orient the students in using Empirical Methodologies
- F. Support staff was trained to use computers.

5. Obstacles faced if any and strategies adopted to overcome them:

Obstacles faced:

More Faculty and the students need to be motivated to participate in research activities. There was an initial resistance from students as they were unsure of how research will help them to get good marks.

Strategies adopted to overcome them:

Reducing the teaching workload and giving cash incentives to the Faculty to participate in Research activities.

Motivating the students to take part in Research activities and recognizing their Research culture and talent.

Constant efforts are made by the Faculty and the eminent persons to inculcate rationale attitude and analytical abilities amongst students

6. Impact of the Practice:

- Students are more aware of environment, showed enhanced skills in Information Technology, and inclined to better utilize the infrastructure in the institution
- Discussions with Alumni revealed that majority of the students are opting for PG courses
- The success of some intensive Sports Programs was seen in students winning more medals in tournaments
- Few non-teaching staff acquired primary skills in using computer, internet, and social media
